Contributions:

Pledged contributions are up due to prepayments in the first 4 months of the year. Loose offering is below budget \$700. General Endowments for operating are \$1,860 in excess of the amount budgeted. Interest and Dividends are \$2,700 above budget. Overall Income in excess of budget is \$2,454 at April 30, 2019.

Expenses:

Overall expenses are below budget by \$21,888 at April 30, 2019. Purchase rewards from Sam's Club covered the cost of memberships fees. Heating & AC repair and building maintenance are over budget due to boiler pipe repairs, a new heater for the WYDACA area and other unexpected repairs. Personnel costs are below budget by \$15,000. Evaluations and wage increases that will occur during the year will reduce this amount.

At April 30, 2019, revenues exceeded expenses by \$32,824. Please contact the Finance Office if you would like a copy of the detailed financial report for the period ending April 30, 2019.

Over the past two years several Script articles about Westminster's Memorial Garden have addressed the history, procedure to purchase an agreement, a follow-up to the June 2017 open house and several testimonies by WPC members. In that time, three more members have been interred in the Garden, brochures have been placed in the literature racks and more agreements have been purchased.

The Memorial Garden committee is planning another open house on June 30 after the 10:30 a.m. worship service. Information about the

Garden will be available. You can also tour the Garden, speak with a funeral home representative and enjoy refreshments. Jim and Barb Shriner have offered their thoughts about why they have chosen the Memorial Garden. "We have been active members of Westminster for over 40 years. Our children both grew up in the church and were married here. Our extended family is familiar with the church and feel comfortable here. It just made sense to choose the church as our final resting place."

Although a decision like this might not be an easy one for everyone, the process is quite simple. An interment agreement can be purchased at any time. The cost is \$1,000. The agreement allows that cremated remains, ashes, will be placed in the Garden during a brief service of commemoration. A plaque with the member's name, date of birth and date of death will be placed on a wall in the Garden. With the exception of the \$200 cost of the plaque, the amount of the agreement is tax deductible. On Friday night the tent was erected on the Johnstone patio, the tables were set up, and all the plants were transported from the garden to the patio and arranged. The tent is a FEMA tent that was brought here from New Orleans after Katrina, and has served us well. Business was brisk on Saturday during the Kiwanis pancake breakfast, and also

on Sunday after the service. The sale netted \$1,130.65! The money will be used wisely, as maintaining our beautiful Celtic garden comes at a price. It will go toward buying annuals and perennials, fertilizer, mulch, a portion of the water bill, maintenance of the sprinkler system and the fountain, and other expenses.

past four centuries. The restoration process for this organ will prove to be a combination of mechanical and restorative expertise. For the organ's newest additions of pipes, the way forward is more simple. 10 or 15 year old pipes can be easily replaced. However, for pipes that are older and more delicate, great care will be needed to ensure that these pipes will last for several more centuries to come. Westminster Presbyterian Church is similarly doing some major refurbishment work on our magnificent Schantz organ. Built in 1998, our current Schantz organ replaced a Möller organ built in 1950. The Schantz Organ has 4,094 pipes, 71 ranks, 85 independent stops and 4 divisions. By way of comparison, the Notre Dame Organ has 7,800 pipes, 113 ranks, and 8 divisions. Much like Notre Dame, our organ retains some excellent pipework from the previous instrument, dating back some 70 years.

In January 2018, Westminster hired an outside consultant to diagnose mechanical issues related to the organ's 20 year old age. This report confirmed that our instrument is still in great shape, but needs a few alterations and technological upgrades to make it viable instrument for the new generation of organists. After consultation with many organ builders, the church has awarded the Schantz company a contract to update the organ's control system and to deal with concerns regarding the "speech of pipes." The speech of pipes is regulated through a process known as "voicing." This process is most crucial to an organ's success. While an instrument can be installed successfully, it is the continuous alteration to the pipe's speech that make an instrument "great." To this effect, the church has also hired the renowned organ consultant Patrick Fischer to assist with diagnosing the long term needs of our organ's speech and artistic clarity. While Schantz will fix any mechanical issues, Mr. Fischer will spend time prioritizing which stops of the organ need the most attention as we look forward to it's new future.

We will look forward to hearing the fruits of our organ refurbishment project on Sunday, September 8. An organ concert will kick of the 5@5 season, as well as show off the organ's new capabilities under the masterful fingers and feet of Colin McKnight, a New York based organist who is considered one of the preeminent rising stars in the organ world. Our organ is certainly not like Notre Dame's, but it exemplifies the unmistakable quality of American organ building as it has developed since 1950.

A Reflection on Pipe Organs: Notre Dame Cathedral and Westminster Presbyterian Church

In the wake of the tragic fire that consumed Notre Dame Cathedral on April 15, music historians and music lovers alike were eager to know the extent of the damage on the Cathedral's legendary pipe organ. Dr. Olivier Latry, the primary organist of the Cathedral (and my first collegiate organ professor) reported that the

organ had survived the fire, but would still need to be removed and restored to address the inevitable damage related to smoke and dust exposure.

While one might assume that this organ's value hinges on its size, this would be incorrect. To recreate an exact replica of Notre Dame's organ (with brand new materials) would cost roughly 4.5 million dollars. For many churches, this is the standard cost of a large pipe organ. Contrastingly, the aspects of the Notre Dame organ that make it so priceless are the hoards of pipes that date back to the 17th and 18th centuries. I jokingly refer to this instrument as "Frankenstein," since it contains so many disparate pipes from different centuries and organ building aesthetics. Since 1730, the organ has been refurbished every 25-50 years, by builders who represent different aesthetics and musical priorities. Serious work on the organ occurred in 1733, 1783, 1812, 1838, 1868, 1894, 1904, 1942, 1963, 1966, 1975, 1992, and 2014.

Every time the organ undergoes a refurbishment, the newest organ builder retains the best of the remaining pipe work, and throws out what they deem to be unsuccessful. Thus, the organ at Notre Dame represents a composite of the best of organ building as it has manifested in France in the
