Pastor's Corner

God Has a Plan for Us

In a typical year, the first Sunday following Labor Day highlights our annual Rally Day celebration. Ordinarily, this is the occasion when we welcome the return of our choirs and bell choirs in addition to education for all ages. In an effort to make this Rally Day even more meaningful, we originally made preparations to present the biennial Eberts' Lecture Series to coincide with our fall return, and we were excited to welcome The Reverend Dr. Will Willimon from Duke Divinity School as our guest speaker.

Yet, as we are all painfully aware, 2020 is no typical year. As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, in-person worship and gatherings have now been suspended since March, with no clear return date in sight. In the midst of these most unusual circumstances, I am grateful to those who continue to provide programming in the life of the church to care for individuals across generations and life circumstances. Godly Play teachers, including Lisa Bansen-Harp, Jamie Willis, Kara Hoffman, and Deb Tondra are pre-recording stories for the benefit of our children. Margo Works, Susan Shellito and Walter Hayes continue to minister to the Tweens among us on Sunday mornings via Zoom. Andi Jopperi and Mike Grau remain committed to serving as youth instructors. And Rae Leonard continues to lead a weekly, adult education conversation. While Rae's class was previously held on Sunday mornings, it is now offered on Thursday evenings utilizing Zoom technology.

Our Third Sunday Dinner crew continues to seek to serve the needs of those less fortunate, and we are grateful to the congregation for the continued donation of requested food items that are then distributed to our neighbors in need as part of an additional service project. I, along with my colleagues in ordained ministry, often hear folks speak about whether the church they attend is now "open" or "closed." Such terminology makes us cringe every time. The truth is that the church never closed. We simply learned to minister in new ways.

I hope that you will join me in exploring how we can continue to open our hearts in service of others amid challenging and unusual circumstances. For just as the church never closed, the needs of those within our church family and the neighbors beyond our fellowship never went away. This means that we are each learning to be the church for such a time as this. Friends, God is still at work, and God has a plan for us. Let us respond by offering the gifts of our lives.

Peace, Jon and when to resume in-person worship and other activities. This is particularly important for those involved in planning fall activities. We recognize that many miss and would like to resume in-person activities. We also recognize that many are concerned about the risk of contracting the coronavirus. The problem with setting a fixed date for resumption of in-person activities is that the date could change as circumstances change. Session decided that in-person activities could resume based on certain criteria being met. The criteria are that the seven-day rolling average of new cases reported in the State of Ohio drops below 500 and sustains an overall downward trajectory or plateaus at a level of less than 400 for a period of 45 days. On August 25, the seven-day average was 939.

During our July 28 meeting, we adopted Coronavirus Quarantine Guidelines for staff and members. These include quarantine requests related to certain long-distance travel and recognizing the State of Ohio Health Department mandate to wear masks while in the church building.


Memorial Garden

Many articles about life in our city, state, nation and the world in general, have had some reference to the unprecedented times we are living in. And those references also hold true to Westminster. Our church has done it is best to "weather" these times and will continue to do so in the effort to make things as "normal" as possible. But one of the hardest things to deal with is the honoring of those who have passed away. Unfortunately, in recent weeks several members of our church family have passed away: Charles Pearson, Mary Ann Strassburg, Mary Jo Stasell, and most recently Martha Nelson, Bob Pierson, Harriet Cutler and Gene Dickerson. Though none of these members, except for Harriet have chosen to make their final resting place Westminster's Memorial Garden, we certainly pray for them and their families.

The Memorial Garden committee encourages WPC members, former members, and their families to consider this option. Although a decision like this might not be an easy one for everyone, the process is quite simple. An Interment Agreement can be purchased at any time. The cost is \$1,000. The agreement allows that cremated remains, ashes, will be placed in the garden during a brief service of commemoration. This could follow a memorial service in the church. A plaque with the member's name, date of birth and date of death will also be placed on a wall in the garden. With the exception of the \$200 cost of the plaque, the amount of the agreement is tax deductible.
