

# The Script March 2025



#### "Create in Me A Clean Heart, O God"

This familiar petition appears at the midpoint of Psalm 51, which we will read responsively at the Ash Wednesday service at 7:00 p.m. on March 5.

Psalm 51 is an appropriate psalm for the season of Lent, as it speaks both to our sinfulness and to God's "mercy" and "steadfast love" (verse 1). In the Western tradition, Lent is a forty-day period of prayer, reflection, and penitence in imitation of Jesus' forty days in the wilderness prior to his public ministry. A period of prayer and fasting leading up to Easter and, for some, Baptism at the Easter Vigil, was part of the practice of the early Church and was formalized in the early 4th century.

On the first day of Lent, it became customary for the faithful to be reminded of the need for penitence and of their own mortality by receiving ashes, either sprinkled on top of worshippers' heads or marked in the shape of a cross on their foreheads—hence the name Ash Wednesday.

Christians choose to observe Lent in a variety of ways. Some choose to give up particular pleasures such as sweets, or to fast from Facebook. Others prefer not to "give up" but to "take on" particular practices during Lent—spending twenty minutes each day in contemplative prayer, or reading a book specially written or compiled for the season of Lent (*Show Me the Way*, a compilation of writings by the late Catholic priest Henri Nouwen, is a favorite of mine).

Lent is a time for growth in our faith as we prepare for the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. A key theme of this season is reconciliation with God and with one another through the grace of Jesus Christ. While solemn in tone, Lent is also a season of healing and hope.

I plan to pray these verses from Psalm 51 each morning, and to repeat and reflect on one of the lines from these verses as I go about each of the forty days of Lent:

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me. Do not cast me away from your presence, and do not take your holy spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and sustain in me a willing spirit (Psalm 51:10-12).

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### A letter from Christina Hodgkinson, Executive Director of the International Welcome Center:

"Yet, as we celebrate the good that's happening, we also face an urgent and heavy reality. The recent executive order suspending the U.S. Refugee Resettlement Program has left refugee families in limbo.

This decision weighs heavily on all of us."

"Now more than ever, let us stand united in prayer and action for the vulnerable individuals and families navigating this uncertainty."

"Your generosity does more than support our mission – it breathes life into it, creating hope and connection when it's needed most"

In light of these new developments, our collection of household goods will be in limbo until further notice.

Per capita is an opportunity for all communicant members of Westminster Presbyterian Church through its governing bodies (Eastminster Presbytery, Synod of the Covenant, General Assembly) to participate equally, responsibly, and interdependently by sharing the cost of coordination and evaluation of mission; and of performing ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions that identify a Reformed Church, while strengthening the sense of community among Presbyterians.

Westminster's per capita amount per person for 2025 is \$33.00 and is composed of \$18.76 for Eastminster Presbytery; \$3.40 for Synod of the Covenant; and \$10.84 for General Assembly.

Consider paying your per capita to help Westminster offset the amount being used from our budget.

#### From the Desk of the Clerk of Session:

The regular meeting of Session was on Tuesday, January 28, 2025.

The following corporate officers were re-elected for 2025:

Alec Works, Clerk of Session; James Cole, Treasurer; and Marcia Holcomb, Assistant Treasurer.

Average in-person attendance in December was 89, including 190 on Christmas Eve. Average YouTube viewings were 72. Official membership on 12/31/24 is 221. Dottie Erb and Brian Rodabaugh were elected as commissioners to the March 11th meeting of Eastminster Presbytery.

April 6 was set as the date for the Annual Congregational Meeting.

Ed Labbe reported that the Pastoral Nominating Committee continues to review profiles and speak with prospective candidates. Larger contributions in December and interest/dividend income, along with lower personnel costs, reduced the projected 2024 year-end deficit to approximately \$36,000. A preliminary 2025 Operating Budget was also distributed. With lower pledged contributions and budgeting for a full-time pastor for 9 months, over \$290,000 is currently budgeted from reserves to cover the projected deficit.

There is significant work to be done on the church building. The largest expenditures continue to be personnel and properties. Several motions were approved, including several collections by Outreach and events sponsored by Discipleship and Worship.

#### 2. Prayer to Protect from Any Temptation




#### 3. Lent Prayer for Protection




