

Making Sense of Life

Austrian psychiatrist Viktor Frankl spent three years in Auschwitz and other concentration camps. After being liberated from Auschwitz in 1945 he wrote his classic book, *Man's Search for Meaning*. In Auschwitz, Frankl had learned from his own experience and by observing those around him that "a person's main concern is not to gain pleasure or to avoid pain, but to find a meaning in life."

In her book *The Power of Meaning: Crafting a Life That Matters* (2017), Emily Esfahani Smith says that a meaningful life "makes sense," is driven by a sense of purpose, is significant and worthwhile, and is part of something bigger. She identifies four "pillars of meaning": belonging, purpose, transcendence, and storytelling.

Citing numerous studies, Smith identifies *belonging* as the most important driver of meaning. Relationships of mutual care; frequent, pleasant interactions with others; intimate, high-quality connections; and reaching out to others are all aspects of belonging.

Those who have a *purpose* in life have a stable and far-reaching goal, an organizing principle that is aimed at making a difference in the world by contributing to matters larger than the self.

To "transcend" means, literally, "to climb across."

Transcendence is the experience of a higher reality or principle that provides a source of meaning and well-being. For Christians, God is transcendent; for secular humanists, humanistic values such justice, dignity, and equity may be considered transcendent.

Through *storytelling*, we bring disparate parts of our lives together into a unified narrative, allowing us to understand our lives as coherent and meaningful. Storytelling is an important part of "making sense" of everyday experience.

One of the gifts of being part of a faith community is that religious life weaves together these four pillars of meaning. We belong to a faith community, Westminster Presbyterian Church, and we belong to each other as fellow travelers on life's journey. As Christians, we have intrinsic purpose: to grow into the knowledge and love of God, and to live out the Gospel of Jesus Christ in service to others. For us, God is both a transcendent, constant, surpassing reality and an immanent, sustaining presence.

According to the Beacon Journal, Westminster was among the nineteen Protestant, Catholic, and Jewish congregations that participated in the equity march at Akron Pride on August 23, 2025.

"It was faith organizations – Protestant churches and a synagogue – that may have outnumbered any one category of marchers. The overwhelming message to the community was love and acceptance, including signs that read: "Love wins," "Love your neighbor," and "You're loved as you are."

And, we are storytellers, telling the story of our faith journey, and doing so within the context of the master narrative in which we anchor our faith journey: the story of God's love and faithfulness made known in Scripture and experienced in the lives of God's people through the ages.

We all struggle, at times, to "make sense" of what is happening in our lives and in the world around us. Being mindful of the four pillars of meaning can be a helpful way to get our bearings when we feel adrift. Some questions to ponder:

Belonging: to whom do I belong? How can I reach out to others to form communities of belonging?

Purpose: what does life expect of me, today?

How can I make a difference?

Transcendence: what Being, values and principles are central, for me? How does that impact my daily experience?

For what do I hope?

Storytelling: how has God been present for me and those dear to me over the years?

How is God present for me, today?



Each child was blessed to be able to go home with a new school backpack filled with school supplies and surprises to help them make a successful transition to the start of the school year.

One IWC volunteer who brought one of the Afghani families commented that this was the first time she had seen the 12-year-old daughter smile.

The dictionary defines the word *blessing* as something that brings happiness. While the generosity of our church was a blessing for these children and their families, the experience was also a blessing for all of the Westminster members and friends who contributed to helping to make the event successful. This included members who contributed basic school supplies along with Highland Square Rehabilitation and Nursing Center, Acme, members who went shopping for new backpacks and school gear for their "adopted" IWC families, the Discipleship and Outreach committees, the Deacons, and the many volunteers who worked to set-up, run, and clean up the carnival.

A total of 20 immigrant families and 49 children from seven different countries were the recipients of Westminster's generosity and love. Blessings all around!
